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CYBER-SAFETY USE AGREEMENT YEAR 3-7

Dear Parent/Caregiver & Student,

The measures to ensure the cyber-safety of students at Walkerville Primary School are based on our core values. To assist us to enhance learning through the safe use of information and communication technologies (ICTs), we are now asking you to read this document and sign the attached Use Agreement Form.

Rigorous cyber-safety practices are in place, which include Cyber-Safety Use Agreements for staff and learners, who have been involved in the development of the agreement. Child protection education, such as the Keeping Safe Child Protection Curriculum, includes information about remaining safe when using new technologies and is provided to all learners.

The computer network, Internet and wireless access facilities, computers and other ICT equipment/devices bring great benefits to the teaching and learning programs at Walkerville Primary School, and to the effective operation of the school. The ICT equipment is for educational purposes appropriate to this environment, whether it is owned or leased either partially or wholly by the school and used on or off the site. The overall goal of Walkerville Primary School is to create and maintain a cyber-safety culture that is in keeping with our values and with legislative and professional obligations. The Use Agreement includes information about your obligations, responsibilities, and the nature of possible consequences associated with cyber-safety breaches that undermine the safety of the school environment.

All students will be issued with a Use Agreement and once signed consent has been returned to school, students will be able to use the school ICT equipment or BYOD. Material sent and received using the network may be monitored and filtering and/or monitoring software may be used to restrict access to certain sites and data, including e-mail. Where a student is suspected of an electronic crime, this will be reported to the South Australian Police. Where a personal electronic device such as a mobile phone is used to capture images of a crime, such as an assault, the device will be confiscated and handed to the police.

While every reasonable effort is made by schools and Department of Education administrators to prevent children's exposure to inappropriate content when using the department's online services, it is not possible to completely eliminate the risk of such exposure. In particular, Department of Education cannot filter Internet content accessed by your child from home, from other locations away from school or on mobile devices or wireless owned by your child. Department of Education recommends the use of appropriate Internet filtering software.

- respond to any breaches in an appropriate manner
- welcome enquiries at any time from parents/caregivers/legal guardians or children about cyber-safety issues.

My responsibilities include:

- discussing the information about cyber-safety with my child and explaining why it is important
- supporting the school's cyber-safety program by emphasising to my child the need to follow the cyber-safety strategies
- contacting the Principal or ICT Coordinator to discuss any questions I may have about cyber-safety and/or this Use Agreement.

STRATEGIES TO HELP KEEP WALKERVILLE PRIMARY SCHOOL CYBER-SAFE

Parents/caregivers play a critical role in developing knowledge, understanding and ethics around their child's safety and safe practices regardless of the time of day. Being cyber-safe is no exception and we invite you to discuss with your child the following strategies to help us stay safe when using ICT at school and after formal school hours.

1. I will not use school ICT equipment until my parents/caregivers and I have signed my Use Agreement Form and the completed form has been returned to school.
2. I will use the computers, iPads, Laptops and other ICT equipment only for my learning.
3. I will go online or use the Internet at school only when a teacher gives permission and an adult is present.
4. If I am unsure whether I am allowed to do something involving ICT, I will ask the teacher first.
5. If I have my own username (eg. email address), I will log on only with that username. I will not allow anyone else to use my name.
6. I will keep my password private.
7. I will use the Internet, e-mail, mobile phones or any ICT equipment only for positive purposes, not to be mean, rude or offensive, or to bully, harass, or in any way harm anyone else, or the school itself, even if it is meant as a joke.
8. While at school, I will:
 - attempt to search for things online that I know are acceptable at our school. This would exclude anything that is rude or violent or uses unacceptable language such as swearing
 - report any attempt to get around, or bypass, security, monitoring and filtering that is in place at our school on both the computing and wireless network.
9. If I find anything that upsets me, is mean or rude, or that I know is not acceptable at our school, I will: not show others, turn off the screen and get a teacher straight away.
10. Only with written permission from home and the school will I bring any ICT equipment/devices to school; this includes things like mobile phones, iPods, games, cameras, and USB/portable drives.
11. I will keep my device name iPad/Laptop as my student name except in special circumstances.
12. Only with written permission from the teacher will I connect any ICT device to school ICT, or run any software (eg a USB/portable drive, camera or phone). This includes all wireless/Bluetooth technologies.
13. The school cyber-safety strategies apply to any ICTs brought to school.
14. I will turn off cellular data, iMessage's, notifications, any chat conversations during the school day (unless this is for an issue previously discussed with the teacher). I will not be involved in group chat via any message app with more than 3 friends.
15. To ensure appropriate network filters, students will only connect to the school wireless network, to be set up by a member of staff.
16. To ensure my compliance with copyright laws, I will download or copy any files such as music, videos, games or programs only with the permission of a teacher or the owner of the original material.



17. I will ask my teacher's permission before I put any personal information online. Personal identifying information includes any of the following: my full name, address, e-mail address, phone numbers, photos of me and/or people close to me.
18. I will respect all school ICTs and will treat all ICT equipment/devices with care. This includes:
 - not intentionally disrupting the smooth running of any school ICT systems
 - not attempting to hack or gain unauthorised access to any system
 - following all school cyber-safety strategies, and not joining in if other students choose to be irresponsible with ICTs
 - reporting any breakages/damage to a staff member.
19. If I do not follow cyber-safety practices the school may inform my parents/caregivers. In serious cases, the school may take disciplinary action against me. My family may be charged for repair costs. If illegal material or activities are involved or e-crime is suspected, it may be necessary for the school to inform the police and hold securely personal items for potential examination by police. Such actions may occur even if the incident occurs off-site and/or out of school hours.

WALKERVILLE PRIMARY SCHOOL STUDENT MOBILE PHONE POLICY

Walkerville Primary School acknowledges that mobile phones may be used as a safety measurement out of school hours for children who travel alone, on public transport or for those students who walk to school.

Parents are reminded that in cases of emergency, the school office remains the vital and appropriate point of contact to ensure your child is reached quickly and assisted in any appropriate way.

The decision to provide a mobile phone to their children should be made by parents or guardians. Parents should be aware if their child takes a mobile phone onto school premises.

Please note, the school accepts no responsibility for:

- Loss, damage or theft of mobile phones while travelling to and from school.
- Investigation of theft of phones. Students will be advised to report the theft to SA Police.
- The Department for Education does not provide insurance for accidental loss or damage to devices brought to schools for use by students. However, claims may be met under the department's public liability insurance where the loss or damage is attributable to a negligent act or omission on the part of the school.

Acceptable Use

- Mobile phones are to be switched off during school time
- Mobile phones remain the responsibility of the student. They are to be handed to the teacher and are not to be taken into the school yard. Where a teacher accepts the responsibility to store them, they will be kept in a locked cupboard and returned at the end of the school day.

Unacceptable Use

- Students with mobile phones may not engage in personal attacks harass another person or post private information about another person using SMS, the internet, taking/sending photos or objectionable images and phone calls.



- Mobile phones or any electronic communication devices eg iPods, iPads, etc. are not to be used to make calls, send SMS messages, surf the internet, take photos or any other application on school grounds.
- Students using mobile phones inappropriately at school will face disciplinary action as sanctioned by the Leadership team. The school has the legal right and responsibility to hold a student's mobile phone to be handed to the SA Police if there are any concerns re inappropriate material on the phone or possible evidence of electronic abuse or harassment.
- Accessing the internet by using a mobile phone will be considered a breach of the school's code of conduct regarding computer use and will result in access privileges to the school's computers being withdrawn.

Any student who is found to have a mobile phone on them during school time will be asked to take it to the front office.
